Folkestone & Hythe District Council, East Kent Health & Care Partnership, Kent Community Health, Social Enterprise Kent

Folkestone & Hythe District Council partnered with the NHS and Social Enterprise Kent (including community groups) to host a drop-in at the Folca building in November last year supporting the people of Folkestone. During the event community safety awareness information was shared, ranging from road safety to the domestic abuse one stop shop, human trafficking, modern slavery and the team handed out personal alarms, whistles, torches and snap bracelets.

The Healthwatch award recognised the collaborative working of the organisations to achieve a well-attended event.



Op Sceptre

On 15 May, the Community Safety Officers worked on Op Sceptre a national knife campaign supported by Kent Police to raise awareness of knife crime. The Op is led by Caley Walden, Kent Police Violence Reduction Unit (VRU) Co-ordinator, worked with partners agencies to detect and prevent knife crime in our district. PC Swainston and PC Obbard and Julian Streader the KCC Youth Hub delivery manager.

The officers started from Folkestone Town Bus Station and divided into two groups of three visiting retailers



and giving staff posters to display. The outlets included Choice, TK Maxx, Poundland, ASDA, Savers, McDonald's, a charity shop, Taco Bell, Sainsburys and a military supply store.

Knife wand sweeps were conducted in St Eanswythe's churchyard, the Harbour area, and Payers Park where a grinder and a small razor blade were found. The teams checked the knife bin located in Payers Park and talked to members of the public and retailers.

2023 Tall Ships project

30 young people from Folkestone and Hythe took part in an exciting cross border weekend of sporting activities as part of the Tall Ships project. Pupils, aged 13 to 14, were selected by local schools joined 30 young people from twin town Boulogne in France on the Tall Ships adventure that was postponed in 2021 due to Covid.

The 2023 project, supported by Folkestone & Hythe District Council and Boulogne Town Hall, began on 18 May with the French young people visiting Folkestone for 4 days, Lexie Foord from Community Safety also attended.

The group enjoyed four days of activities and challenges organised by Trust including water sports, orienteering and a visit to the F51 - Skate Park Climbing Centre | Boxing Club.

The first day comprised of climbing and learning how to skateboard including scootering and drawing designs underneath the skateboard. On the second day the young people enjoyed swimming, volleyball, rounders, and dodge ball.

On day three some of the youngsters split into groups with some heading to the Warren to take part in educational walks, hiking, identifying various species of butterflies and some youngsters played beach volleyball, paddling for sea glass and skimming stones on the sea. The last day was spent walking along The Leas, Coastal Park, boardwalk, Harbour Arm with some of the French youngsters heading to the shops.

On 1 June to 4 June, Lexie Foord headed to Boulogne as part of the return exchange held in Boulogne-sur-Mer, France where 13 local pupils were chosen, based on their attendance, commitment, and motivation, to crew the Tall Ship Thalassa alongside their French counterparts on a five-day voyage in July.

They are due to set sail from Folkestone Harbour on 9 July arriving in Boulogne in time for the famous sea festival (La Côte D'Opale fête la Mer) – a gathering of tall ships and traditional boats attracting hundreds of thousands of visitors.

The Tall Ships opportunity of a lifetime uses the physical challenges of sailing and competitive sports as a vehicle to break down language barriers, raise aspirations, improve self-confidence and self-esteem, and develop team spirit.



Folkestone Talks

On 20 April, the Community Safety Unit and Environmental Enforcement officers attended the Turner Free School, Morehall Primary School and Folkestone Primary School giving talks and handing out leaflets and safety advice.







Folkestone Talks is organised by the Turner Stone

other partners.

Try Angle is run by Kent County Council Youth Hub and put together by young people. The awards are to celebrate and provide recognition to young people in our district who have achieved good things e.g. shown progression within themselves or who have helped the community.



Lexie Foord handed the award for Positive Intervention to the Youth Hub SpeakOut Group. Lexie spoke about how this group has developed and grown since it was established in 2020. To start with this group was formed to get young people's voices and opinions on the Young People's Partnership Conversation, but it has grown into so much more.

The group wanted to not only continue youth voice activities but also focus on wellbeing activities for both themselves and others in the district. During this time, they've really developed their communication and teamwork skills and Lexie feels honoured that she has seen their growth.

Previously this used to be quite a quiet group but now it has developed a strong network supporting each other and those in the community. During July 2022, the group helped with the recruitment and selection for three new workers in the team. They were a fantastic help and represented the hub well. They also have reviewed Reconnect grants and helped to decide where the money went.

Lexie highlighted how proud she is of all of them and what they have achieved.

Op Chinnock

On 30 May, the Community Safety Unit, KCC Community Wardens, Southern Housing Group PCSOs held a community engagement event



with residents from Moore Close in Brenzett following a Community Trigger raised. A Community Trigger allows residents in a community to ask the CSP (Community Safety Partnership) to review responses to complaints of ASB (anti-social behaviour). Residents and young people came together and planted various plants in wooden containers funded by Southern Housing. Partners conducted door knocking, wellbeing visits including home checks. Early Help conducted youth engagement.

Protecting Your Digital Footprint

What goes online, stays online.

What does your digital footprint look like?





Every time

you use visit a website, send or receive a message or email, buy or book anything online, comment on a post, upload a photo or find directions on your phone, you're

adding to your digital footprint.

The internet provides many positive experiences, but we could probably all benefit from thinking more about the trail we leave online.

Your digital footprint is part of your online history and can potentially be seen by other people, or tracked and held in multiple databases, however careful you are with your privacy settings.

This month the Get Safe Online campaign considers what might happen as a result of <u>Your Digital Footprint</u> and provides tips and advice on what you can do to protect your digital trail.

Advice regarding Rogue Traders

Please see the below advice as Kent residents are reminded to be vigilant against rogue traders operating in parts of the County after an elderly woman was targeted for large sums of cash.

- ➤ If someone knocks at your door, always refuse on the spot repairs or maintenance.
- Don't allow anyone to pressure you into agreeing to have work carried out. If you ask them to leave and they don't, contact the police on 999.
- Don't ever go to a bank or cash point with a trader; legitimate traders would never do this.
- Use reputable traders who are members of the KCC Trading Standards approved trader scheme <u>Trading Standards Checked (kent.gov.uk)</u>
- Ask for quotes in writing and check that the tradesperson is from the company they say they are from.

Kent Police state: 'Some criminals will look to exploit the more vulnerable members of our communities by charging exorbitant amounts of money for work that is often completely unnecessary or at best substandard. 'We would urge residents not to deal with cold callers who knock on doors offering work to clean driveways, repair roofs or to maintain garden shrubs, hedges and trees. 'We are also asking

| neighbours to keep an eye out for vulnerable people, including the elderly. If you see anything suspicious don't hesitate to call the police.' |
