## **Community Safety Update and Events**

#### **Bouverie Place – 17 November – Op Sceptre**

Op Sceptre a week-long campaign from 13 November to 19 November highlighted the commitment of the police working with the public and partners to prevent young people becoming involved in serious violence.

Tara Liam from Community Safety, Neil Staveley, KCC warden, along with Caley Walden from The Kent and Medway Violence Reduction Unit (VRU) had a stand in Bouverie Place on 17 November engaging with about 45 members of the public.

VRU is a joint partnership between the police, local councils, health service providers and other key agencies to deliver a reduction in violence to the county. The aim is that police and partner agencies working together help lift vulnerable young people out of a life of crime.





#### **National Safeguarding** Adults Week - 20 November to 24 November 2023

As part of the annual Safeguarding Adults Weeks from 20 to 24 November. Scott Butler from Community Safety, along with HomeStartShepway/, Neil Staveley, KCC warden and staff from KCC Children's Social Services were at Bouverie Place in Folkestone on 24 November. The officers gave safeguarding advice and signposted to relevant partner agencies.

#### **Tips for a safe Christmas and New Year**

#### **Belongings and Shopping:**

- Place your hand over the ATM when withdrawing cash ensuring no one can see your PIN number and that no one is standing behind or too close.
- Leave valuables at home, only take with you what you need for a trip out.
- If you have a bag, keep it fastened and to the front of your body.
- Keep valuables out of sight, spread around your person (for example keep your phone in a bag, your house keys in a pocket and money in a jacket).
- Keep wallets, phones, and personal items out of the back pockets of jeans and trousers.
- Use a purse chain if you can.
- Never leave your belongings unattended or in easy reach, for example on the top of a pram, a shopping trolley, or a mobility scooter.
- Security-mark your valuables, they can be more easily identified if lost or stolen.

#### Car

- Keep valuables safe and do not display on the back seat of your vehicle, securely place them in the boot of the car.
- If defrosting the vehicle, never leave the car unattended or unlocked or with the engine running.



#### Home:

- Dispose of wrapping and packaging, never leave it outside your home or bin
- Securely lock all doors and windows and check the house alarm.
- Close blinds and curtains at night, don't leave your valuables lying about especially under the Christmas tree if displayed in the window.
- Ensure keys are put safely away and not hanging on a hook near the door as burglars can break through windows and reach inside to unlock the door.
- Christmas decorations, throws, blankets, pillows, even wrapping paper should be kept 3-feet from your fireplace. The Christmas tree can serve as a fire hazard if it's not located far enough from your fireplace. Both real trees and synthetic trees can catch fire if they are located too close to your fireplace.

#### **Neighbours**

 Christmas can be a lonely time for so many people, especially the elderly. Check to see if they are safe, warm, and well and that they have essential supplies.

#### **Travel and Nights Out**

 When phoning a taxi, request the cab firm to contact you when they arrive. The taxi driver should be wearing their ID badge on their person, or it should be clearly displayed in their vehicle for the passenger to see.





- Keep an eye on your drinks if in a crowded place or nightclub to avoid potential spiking.
- Plan your route home in advance.

# Protecting Rural Communities and preventing crime in the countryside

Officers from the Folkestone and Hythe's Neighbourhood Task Force have been carrying out patrols in the Romney Marsh area as part of Kent Police's commitment to protect rural communities and prevent crime in the countryside.

On the evening of Sunday 19 November 2023, officers stopped a suspicious van near New Romney, which they suspected was linked to possible wildlife crime.

Two catapults, several ball bearings and a high-powered lamp were seized, and three men are to be issued with Community Protection Warnings (CPWs).

The CPWs will prohibit the men from engaging in poaching and could lead to further action and possible prosecution if they persist.

Public Protection – Kent Facebook page posted they have received more reports of selling scams operated by criminals on Facebook. In this instance it was a private seller who claimed to know a relative of the residents and pretending to be an administrator in the selling group.

## **Kent Fraud Alert System**



#### Caller ID's

Do not rely on caller ID to decide if a call is trustworthy. Criminals can copy legitimate phone numbers, to appear like the genuine organisation. The process is called Spoofing and will appear as a genuine number on your telephone.

If you receive a call and it sounds suspicious then hang up and ring back using a trusted number (not a number supplied by them) on a different telephone, as criminals can remain on the line and

not disconnect the call. If you do not have a different telephone to hand, then wait 5 minutes and ring a family member or friend to ensure the line has been disconnected before making the call.

If you think that you may have been a victim of this or any other type of scam, then contact your Bank immediately, which you can do by calling 159 and report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or call 0300 123 2040.





### **New Published Reports**

**Online safety** 

**Source:** NSPCC Learning **Date**: 23 November 2023

NSPCC Learning has published an evidence review examining children's exposure to online risks and harms in the UK. The review looks at research published since 2017 focusing on online sexual risks. Findings from the evidence suggest: a sizeable minority of children have encountered sexual risks when they have been online; networking platforms that are popular with children are the most frequent places where children are exposed to online sexual harassment; and there are similar emotional, psychological and social outcomes associated with victimisation across the four categories of sexual risk and harm. The review calls for policymakers and regulators to ensure effective collaboration with platforms and the technology industry.

The Lucy FaithFull Foundation has released a new film about online grooming as part of the Stop It Now! campaign, which offers support to adults worried about their own or someone else's sexual thoughts about or behaviours towards children.
